Dear Parents and Carers,

It will be Year 4's turn to go on the residential next year; I am currently in the process of booking their trip, so Year 4 parents please keep an eye out for emails regarding it. Mrs Ball has already asked me if she can go again next year!

Around this time last year I wrote to and held meetings with parents about the importance of parents keeping a close eye about what their children are doing online. Unfortunately, I have had recent reports that there have been issues concerning unkind behaviour out of school between children on devices. Please can I ask parents to keep a close eye on what your children are doing online and if necessary restrict their access to the Internet. Some people gain extra confidence, of the wrong sort, behind a screen and act out of character. We do not want people letting themselves down on screens.

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This week we have been celebrating World Book Day. On Wednesday, we arranged a Dance Workshop for all the children. They performed dances to the Ginger Bread Men and the children loved it! On Thursday, children wore their costumes or comfy clothes and shared books with one another across classes. I had the opportunity to read a story to every child which was fantastic! Reading is so important and with the advancement of technology we must not let the love of reading disappear, we all have a job to do to ensure the love of reading continues and I hope our introduction of the online reading record will help us ensure children read books regularly!

We have had two football matches in the last week and the team has shown much improvement. Although the results didn't go our way we took part in two very close games and achieved performances we were all very proud of; so much resilience was shown by our players. I am delighted to say that this week our attendance has been so strong and it is <u>over our target of 96%</u> for the whole school, please can we have the same again next week. We have not had a whole school 100% attendance day since Covid. That is everyone's challenge for this term and I would love us to achieve it.

This week I had great joy in observing the children's delight concerning how beautiful the crocuses on the field are. The latter have sprung into life in the last week and we could see the insects feeding off the flowers and aiding their pollination. It was only last week, when sharing their holiday homework with me, the children were saying we need to do more to keep the bees alive. It was great to see the bee's important work in action on our field. Our school 'Environment Day' will take place on Tuesday 18th March - more details will be sent to parents next week.

As can be seen by the length of my newsletter it has been a very exciting and busy week! I want to thank all those once again who have shown dedication to the school and children to ensure all these events could take place. ## This week in Worship

Our Focus for Worship this week has been Lent...remembering Jesus' temptation. his G time spent in the desert and what it means for us. Our Bible passage was Luke  $4 ext{ v } 1 - 12$ . Jesus spent 40 days in the desert, fasting & praying. Jesus is sent into the desert to be tempted he was led by the Holy Spirit, this was part of God's plan, he was led by the Holy Spirit to fast and pray. Jesus was tempted by the Devil, three times: 1) he was told to turn stones into bread. Jesus said 'Man shall not live by bread alone but by the word of God.' 2) The devil took Jesus up a high mountain, showed him all the kingdoms of the world in a moment of time. He said, 'All this power will I give you if you worship me.'

Jesus answered 'Get thee behind me Satan. It is written that you shall worship the Lord our God and only him will you serve.' 3) He brought Jesus to Jerusalem and set him on the top of the temple, he said 'If you are the Son of God, jump down form here.' Jesus was the Son of God so could he have done these things! I wonder what kind of leader was Jesus showing he was? Jesus resisted temptation, and proved that his heart wanted to follow God's commands. As the Son of God he chose God's way. How did Jesus find strength and the right answers when he was tempted... I wonder how we could copy Jesus when we are next tempted. We discussed times when we had been 'tempted' to do something and how easy was it to do what we knew was right.

The day before Lent begins, is Shrove Tuesday, otherwise known as Pancake day/'Mardi Gras' and is a chance to use up food, to enable Christians to 'fast' and focus on prayer leading up to Easter. On Shrove Tuesday, Christians confess and ask forgiveness for the wrong they have done as they start preparing for the greatest celebration ever: remembering Jesus' resurrection and how it has brought new life, at Easter. Fasting can enable us to focus our senses on worshipping God, rather than on 'bread alone'/treats.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. Traditionally at the 'ashing' service, Christians say sorry and may be marked with an ash cross on their foreheads to symbolise repentance (often from the ashes of last year's palm crosses). Ashes in the bible symbolise saying sorry.

Please help us to love and serve you with all our heart. Let us show your love through our kind actions, concern for others and by being a light shining out to others.

Lord, when we are tempted to do wrong may we feel your loving presence guiding us to do what we know is right.

# 10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators

The way we engage with text has changed dramatically over the years. Whether reading captions on social media, instructions in a video game or an e-book on a digital device, technology plays a major role in modern literacy. While traditional books remain invaluable, digital tools can enhance reading skills by making text more accessible, interactive and engaging.

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## CHOOSING THE RIGHT TYPE OF TEXT

Before integrating technology, consider the types of text that a child engages with. If they need help on occasion, digital reading pens can assist by scanning and reciting words or sentences. These tools are especially useful for students with reading difficulties, and can even be used in exams if they're part of their routine learning process. Proper training and practice are required, but they can be a great help when tackling printed text.

#### READING ON SCREEN

Many devices now allow users to customise text for better readability. Adjusting font type, size and background colour can significantly enhance comprehension. For many readers, white text on a black background is the easiest to see, whereas other styles – such as dyslexia-friendly fonts – are designed to help those who are struggling. Teaching children how to personalise text settings on their devices empowers them to read more comfortably and with greater confidence.

#### **ACCESSIBILITY TOOLS**

Most modern devices include built-in tools designed to support readers. These features can be found in Settings under Accessibility and may include text-to-speech, speech-to-text and screen magnification functions. Enabling these tools can make digital reading more user friendly, especially for children with learning difficulties or visual impairments, who might have an easier time with spoken language than the written word, or who might simply require a closer look at the text.

#### INTERACTIVE READING **PROGRAMMES**

Many digital reading devices, such as Kindle and other e-readers, offer features like word highlighting, adjustable text speed and built-in dictionaries. These tools help learners to break down complex words and phrases while maintaining an appropriate reading pace. Some programmes even allow users to track their progress, making reading a more structured and motivating experience.

#### VIDEO GAMES AND READING SKILLS

Many video games require players to read instructions, character dialogues and mission objectives, making them an unexpected but effective literacy tool. Games that involve storytelling, puzzles or problem-solving often include large amounts of text – encouraging children to read these texts aloud or discuss them a fun, engaging way.

#### Meet Our Expert

## SUBTITLES AND CLOSED CAPTIONS

Watching videos with subtitles or closed captions is an effective way to enhance reading skills. As children watch their favourite shows or online videos, they can follow along with the text, gaining a better understanding of how written words sound when spoken aloud. This is particularly beneficial for reluctant readers, as it exposes them to words in a familiar, engaging context. Repeatedly watching content with subtitles reinforces word recognition and comprehension.

#### **USING AUDIOBOOKS**

Audiobooks are an excellent way to develop listening and reading skills simultaneously Children can follow along with the text while listening to a narrator, reinforcing word recognition and fluency. For struggling readers, listening to an audiobook before attempting to read the text independently can boost their confidence and comprehension.

## TEXT-TO-VOICE TECHNOLOGY

Text-to-voice software reads digital text aloud, making it easier for learners to follow along. Most smartphones, tablets and computers come with this function built in. When enabled, users can highlight a passage or sentence and press Play to hear it read aloud. This tool is particularly helpful for auditory learners and those who struggle with decoding written words.

## VOICE-TO-TEXT FOR WRITING AND READING

Voice-to-text tools allow users to dictate words, which are then transcribed into text. This feature helps children see the connection between spoke and written language. By using text-to-voice to have their dictated words read back to them, learners can identify mistakes and improve their reading and writing skills simultaneously.

## SOCIAL MEDIA AND PARENTAL CONTROLS

While social media provides opportunities for reading, most platforms have age restrictions of 13–16 years old, making parental guidance essential. Many social media videos include captions and comments that can encourage reading. However, it's important to use the platform's parental controls (such as time limits and content filters) to create a safe and educational online environment for children. Encouraging responsible social media use can ensure a balanced and productive approach to
